WHAT IS AN ILLICIT DISCHARGE?

An Illicit discharge is any direct or indirect non-stormwater discharge to the Spalding County Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4). Non-stormwater discharges can be discharges that occur due to spills, dumping and illicit connections to the MS4 from residential, industrial, commercial or institutional establishments.

The Spalding County **Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4)** is any facility designed or used for collecting and/or conveying stormwater, including municipal roads with drainage systems, curbs, gutters, inlets, catch basins, piped storm drains, structural stormwater controls, ditches, swales, reservoirs, and other drainage structures, and which is:

- Owned or maintained by the county
- Not a combined sewer; and not part of a publicly-owned treatment works.

An **Illicit connection** means either of the following:

- Any pipe, channel, drain or conveyance that allows an illicit discharge to enter the storm drain system
- Any pipe, channel, drain or conveyance connected to the Spalding County MS4 which has not been documented in plans, maps, or equivalent records and approved by an authorized enforcement agency.



Potential sources of Illicit Discharges may include:



- Improper disposal of automotive fluids
- Leaking dumpters
- Failing septic systems
- Sanitary sewer cross connections or overflows
- Wash water from business operations
- Spills
- Wash water from construction related waste (.e.g. concrete, paint, stains, etc.)

A few common signs of illicit discharges include staining

of the curb/gutter and/or street, residues, oil sheens, discoloration of water bodies, odors, turbid or cloudy water, soap suds, and dry weather flows in periods with no rain.

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Exemptions

The following discharges are **not** considered illicit discharges:

- Water line flushing performed by a government agency
- Flows from potable water sources
- Landscape irrigation or lawn watering
- Ground water infiltration into storm drains, uncontaminated pumped ground water, foundation or footing drains, and crawl space pumps
- Air conditioning condensation
- Discharges or flows from firefighting activities, or other discharges necessary to protect public health and safety
- Non-stormwater discharges permitted under an NPDES permit
- Diverted stream flows, springs, natural riparian habitat or wetland flows
- Any other water source not containing pollutants
